Assistant Advocates

- The Assistant Advocates empower families to take a lead role in identifying the steps to have their children returned to them. The Advocates help families explore options for action and continue to work with families to:
 - Do research, investigation and evaluation of the situation
 - Provide important information about the rights and services available
 - Recommend a plan of action to be taken
 - Provide counseling, consulting, and support to implement the plan/action
 - Provide ongoing follow up and a report on progress

Assistant Advocate Challenges

- Residential schools and sixties scoop being perpetuated
- Poverty
- People wanting to talk to someone to have their story recognized and validated
- Crisis Intervention
- Each client has special requests and needs, every story is unique









Assistant Family Advocate Successes

2015-2019 Statistics (FNFAO 4-year program report) Assistant Advocate intakes: 1319

- Reunification 264 families
- Avioded 191 apprehension
- Avoided 46 birth alerts
- Supported 165 kinship placements
- Supported 89 visitations
- Supported 11 guardianships
- Supported 13 families with custody files

Family Reunification

- In April 2017, the AMC was mandated to do a file to file audit of the Child and Family Services Agencies
- FNFAO partnered with South East Child and Family Services (SECFS) to examine case files where there is no real concern for protection
- Reunification workers work at the SECFS agency Tuesday to Thursday and at the FNFAO Mondays and Fridays
- They connect with social workers at SECFS to discuss case plans for children/families to ensure that all parties are working toward reunification









Family Engagement Worker

- Works hand in hand with the Reunification Worker
- Works directly with families to:
 - To accomplish their goals outlined in their initial case plan
 - connect with resources (housing, transportation, EIA applications, support services, donations)
- Once a family is reunify, the family engagement workers will continue to support the family to help with the transition









The Intake Process

- 1. Client Referrals: Families, Social Workers at SECFS, Assistant Advocates at FNFAO (clients fall under SECFS), Public Health Nurses, First Nation or Outside resources
- 2. Meets with families/grandparents to fill out:
 - Intake form (determining if families are seeking reunification)
 - Consent form
 - Collects additional documentation
- 3. Meets with CFS workers pertaining to the family, gathering all information
- 4. Engagement workers meets with family to create a case plan that would speed up the process of reaching the family's goals for reunification







Family Reunification Team Challenges

- Waiting times for programs
- Lack of beds for treatment programs
- Lengthy process to get adequate housing
- Agencies setting up barriers, not cooperative (confidentiality)
- Social workers case planning include unreasonable expectations
- Needing assistance and lack of Reunification and Engagement workers (limited budget)









Family Reunification Team Successes

2018-2019 Statistics (FNFAO 4-year progress report)

Reunification Team intakes: 231

- Reunified 94 families
- Avoided 14 birth alerts
- Avoided 77 apprehensions
- Secured 117 families with visitations
- Supported 21 families with guardianship rights
- Supported 43 kinship placements
- Supported 8 families with custody files
